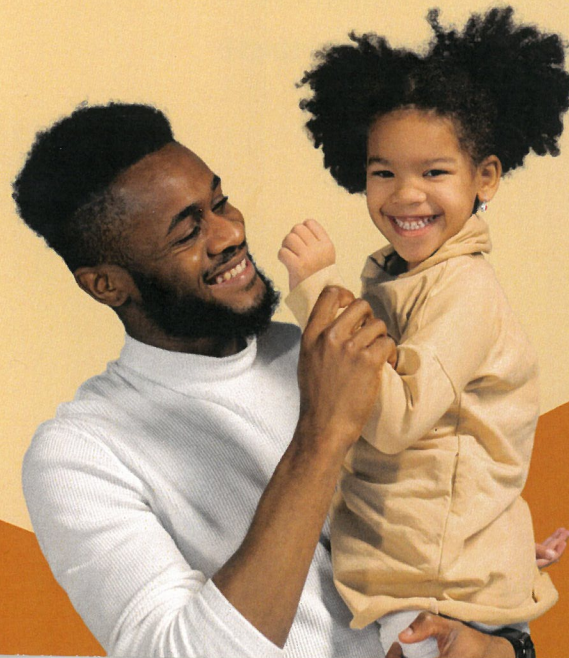

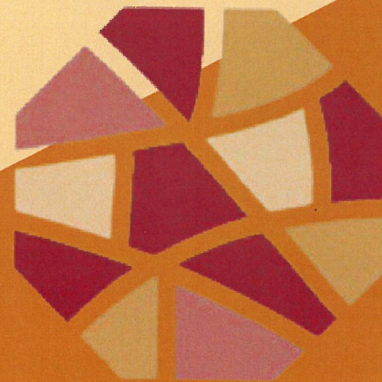


All services are confidential and free for survivors

Legal Services

An attorney or legal representative can provide limited-scope legal services to clients by helping them prepare immigration applications and petitions, including but not limited to:

- Adjustment of Status ("Green Card")
- Asylum
- Citizenship
- Family Reunification
- Employment Authorization

Who do we serve?

Our program serves individuals who have been subjected to torture in a foreign country, their relatives who have been impacted by the torture, and those residing in the United States as refugees, asylees, asylum applicants, immigrants, or citizens.
